THEME OF THE YEAR:

SECURING SUSTAINABLE SOLUTIONS FOR MIGRATION IN SOMALIA



Introduction

The 1st Annual Migration Conference, held on 20 April 2025 in Nairobi, Kenya, marked a pivotal step toward establishing a sustainable and inclusive migration governance framework for Somalia. Jointly organized by Office of the Special Presidential Envoy for Migration, Returns, and Children's Rights (OSPE) and East Africa Institute for Peace and Governance (EAIPG), this landmark event convened key national and international actors to engage in evidence-based policy dialogue and knowledge sharing. The conference's overarching theme, "Securing Sustainable Solutions for Migration in Somalia," reflected a shared vision for a Somalia where migration is safe, orderly, and beneficial to development.

Participants represented a diverse cross-section of Somali society and international stakeholders. including government ministries, foreign missions, civil society organizations. academic institutions. humanitarian development agencies, diaspora professionals, youth networks, and media representatives. This inclusive and participatory approach highlighted the whole of government and whole of society commitment required to address migration challenges in Somalia.

The conference commenced with an inaugural address by H.E. Ambassador Jabril Ibrahim Abdulle, Somali Ambassador to Kenya. He underscored the coordinated of urgency migration governance Somalia and the role of youth and diaspora communities in national fostering development. **Ambassador** Jabril Abdulle called regional and global solidarity with Somalia in managing migration as a cross-cutting issue linked to peace, security, and development.

Ambassador Mariam Yassin Haii Yussuf, Special Presidential Envoy for Migration, Returns. Children's Rights, highlighted the evolution of OSPE, its mandate, and its key achievements. She spotlighted Somalia's National Coordination Mechanism Migration (NCM), return and reintegration frameworks, and the protection of migrant children. remarks framed Her the conference as a springboard for collaborative action, rooted in national ownership and global partnerships.

Anwar Abdifatah Bashir. Director of Executive EAIPG. emphasized the importance of a systemic, data-informed approach migration governance. pointed to Somalia's youthful population as both a challenge and an opportunity and called for inclusive and forward-looking policies.



Harnessing Migration for Resilience and Development: Data, Mobility, and Policy

Background Context

Somalia's migration landscape is characterized by mixed flows, including refugees, returnees, internally displaced persons, and economic migrants. Over three decades of conflict, recurrent drought, and socio-economic instability have led millions to migrate in search of safety, opportunity, and dignity. The absence of comprehensive legal frameworks, limited access to services, and inadequate reintegration mechanisms have further complicated

Key challenges include:

- Persistent insecurity and environmental shocks
- 7 Youth unemployment and lack of vocational training
- OS Gender-specific vulnerabilities and protection gaps
- **Q** Weak data systems and limited coordination among actors
- 05 Digital misinformation exacerbating risky migration behaviour

However, the Somali government, under OSPE's leadership, has made strides in addressing these issues by initiating a National Migration Strategy, operationalizing the National Coordination Mechanism on Migration (NCM), and prioritizing rights-based approaches to migration governance.

Key Outcomes and Takeaways

Institutionalization of the Annual Conference

Agreement among organizers and partners to hold the Migration Conference annually to ensure continuity and accountability.

Youth Engagement

Recognition of youth as key stakeholders and the need to integrate their perspectives in decision-making processes.

Enhanced Coordination

Commitment to strengthen collaboration between government, academia, civil society, diaspora, and international actors through the NCM.

Policy Recommendations

Practical proposals were made, including the establishment of a national migration observatory, diaspora skills mapping, and public awareness campaigns.

New Partnerships

Memoranda of understanding and informal partnerships were initiated during the event, particularly between Somali universities and diaspora-led organizations.

Advocacy and Communication

Emphasis on reframing migration as a development opportunity, not just a challenge.

Conclusion

The 1st Annual Migration Conference demonstrated Somalia's commitment to leading its migration narrative and building inclusive solutions through collaboration, evidence, and innovation. OSPE and EAIPG reaffirmed their commitment to:



- Engage the Somali diaspora in co-designing solutions
- Advocate for policy coherence across institution and sectors

The success of this conference sets a strong foundation for institutional dialogue, policy development, and long-term partnerships aimed at transforming migration into a force for resilience and development.
